In 1978, the National Art Education Association (NAEA) began the National Art Honor Society (NAHS) program specifically for high school students, for the purpose of inspiring and recognizing those students who have shown an outstanding ability in art. The NAHS strives to aid members in working toward the attainment of the highest standards in art areas, and to bring art education to the attention of the school and community.

- Students are eligible for multiple scholarship opportunities that include the Charles M. Robertson Memorial Scholarship, a special four-year scholarship to Pratt Institute School of Art and Design in New York.

Who can be a member of NAHS?

- A junior or senior art student that has been enrolled in an art class for at least one semester and has received a B or better in an art class, holds an overall GPA of 3.5 or higher and has no discipline issues.
